Joan Charnley | Sunflowers

In the 1950s Joan drew a simple sunflower and used it to teach her students how to design repeat pattern textiles. Sixty years later we've taken that sunflower and created a brand new range of designs for the 21st Century, each one inspired by Joan and her extensive textile archive.

always remember seeing
Joan's cotton sunflower
cushion in her dining room
and often wondered why
it took pride of place on her dining
room chair.

It was accompanied by a print of the same design that hung in her utility room, just above the sink where she'd pot her plants and make trays of tea for the garden.

Joan never mentioned what the sunflower design was or when she'd designed it, but after she died we found a folder of drawings and photographs documenting exactly why it was so important to her.

In the 1950s, whilst working as Vice Principle of Textiles at Great Yarmouth School of Art, Joan had drawn the sunflower and used it to teach her design students how to create repeat patterns.

The photographs were charming; there was Joan demonstrating how to screen print, and there were her students, diligently recreating Joan's pattern and creating new designs.

So we thought it would be a fitting tribute to recreate Joan's sunflower design for the 21st century using digital design and contemporary print technology.

Each of the new designs feature Joan's original sunflower but with a twist. We've created repeat patterns, ditsy designs and random layouts, all using authentic 1950s colours and a vintage aesthetic. Each of the designs are available to buy as print-on-demand fabric or wallpaper, printed in Britain and available at the end of the exhibition.

On the top floor you can also see Joan's creative process, exclusive designs never seen before, plus her wonderful 'Wild Flowers of Saddleworth' series, kindly leant to us from Saddleworth Museum.


